HOLD FUNERAL OF FORMER TEACHER

Miss Emma Patton Passed
Away in the Perley Home
in Ottawa

The death of Miss Emma Patton occurred on Thursday night, May 8, at 11:30 o'clock at the Perley Home, Ottawa. The late Miss Patton had been in failing health for several months. She had been a patient in St. Vincent de Paul hospital, Brockville, for some time and was removed by ambulance to the Ottawa nursing home early in February, where she remained until the time of her death.

The late Miss Patton was a retired school teacher, having been educated in Brockville schools and the Ottawa Normal school. She taught for a number of years in Niagara Falls, Sterling, Lansdowne, Bishop's Mills and various other schools.

She was the elder daughter of the late Nathan Patton and his wife, Ann McDonald, of Bishop's Mills, and spent the earlier years of her life in Bishop's Mills and later in Brockville. A sister, Mrs. Charles Moore, predeceased her many years ago. She leaves to mourn her passing one niece, Mrs. Melville Edwards, of Ottawa, and one aunt, Mrs. W. Mellefont, Algonquin, also several cousins, many of whom were present to pay their last respects at the funeral service on Saturday, May 10, at 2 o'clock which was held in the Dickinson Funeral Home, Kemptville, and conducted by Rev. Mr. Adams, of the United church, Oxford Mills, with interment later in Oxford Mills cemetery.

SUDDEN PASSING OF RETIRED INSPECTOR

Resident of Prescott Road,
Robert Andrew Allan Mc-
Connell, Died on Saturday
July 1930

Robert Andrew Allan McConnell, retired public school inspector, passed away quite suddenly at his home, Prescott road, on Saturday morning. He had resided there with his wife for the past year and three months.

Mr. McConnell was born at Aultsville, Ont., a son of Andrew McConnell and his wife, the former Eirena Hamilton. He was raised and educated in Aultsville, and on completion of Normal school training had taught in public schools in Kingston, Lindsay and Peterborough, and was principal of the model school at Madoc. Latterly he was public school inspector in Perth, Prescott, Haileybury and North Bay districts for 20 years until his retirement in 1944.

He was a member of the I.O.-O.F. at Madoc, Ont., and while here was a member of Wain street United church. He leaves many friends throughout the districts where he had taught and been school inspector, as well as many in this vicinity, who learn with regret of his sudden passing.

Surviving him are his wife, the former Isabella Fairgrave, two daughters, Miss Nora E. McConnell, of Montreal, and Mrs. J. D. West, of Renfrew, one son, Frank A. McConnell, R.C.M.P., Regina, Sask., as well as five grandchildren.

Transfer H. W. Knight To New Inspectorate Successor Named

H. W. Knight, B.A., B.Paed., Inspector of Public Schools in Grenville County for the past seven years, will leave Prescott for a new inspectorate in the County of North Ontario, centred on the village of Uxbridge. Word of his appointment was released this week by the Department of Education, the transfer to take effect at the first of September.

Mr. Knight, who came to Grenville for his first inspectorate on September 1st, 1943, obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree from Queen's University, and his Bachelor of Pedagogy from University of Toronto.

C. A. Holmes, native of Shanly District where he taught school for four years, will succeed Mr. Knight as Inspector for Grenville County. A graduate of Western University, London, where he earned his B.A., Mr. Holmes obtained his degree of Bachelor of Pedagogy from University of Toronto.

He taught Public School in Edwardsburg Township four years; was Principal of Nobel Consolidated School from 1928 to 1932, and has been associated with the School for the Deaf, Belleville, for a period of 18 years. Four years of that time were spent in London where Mr. Holmes was in charge of the organization of hard of hearing and deaf classes. Mr. Holmes has been Assistant Principal of the Belleville School for the past five years.

Mr. Holmes hopes to bring his wife, the former Jessie Dobbie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Dobbie of Ventnor, and their 15-year-old daughter Beth to Prescott in time for the beginning of the fall school term if housing accommodation can be secured. "It's like coming home after these years," Mr. Holmes, told The Journal, "and we are looking forward with a great deal of pleasure to taking up residence in Prescott."

Mr. Holmes is a member of the Masonic Order, commencing his membership with Nation Lodge, A.F. & A.M., Spencerville, and taking his Chapter degrees at Grenville Chapter, No. 55, Prescott.

1,500 Uncertified Teachers To Face Rough Time In Fall

TORONTO (CP) — About 1-
 500 uncertified teachers in On-
 tario's elementary schools are
 going to have a tough time land-
 ing jobs next September, the ed-
 ucation department announced
 Friday.

A department statement said
 Ontario teachers' colleges have
 so many students this year that
 department "letters of permis-
 sion"—allowing school boards to
 hire uncertified teachers—will
 be granted only "under very ex-
 ceptional circumstances."

The department anticipates
 that an enrolment of 9,300 stu-
 dents in the colleges' 1968-69
 training term will make it possi-
 ble to staff nearly every class-
 room in Ontario with a fully-
 qualified teacher next Septem-
 ber.

Letters of permission are
 granted to school boards usually
 in remote areas of the province
 where qualified teachers are un-

Giant In His Field

Dr. Charles Baugh, commit-
 tee chairman, said 21 applica-
 tions for the post of education
 director had been studied.

"It is with extreme pride that
 I announce the appointment of
 Lloyd A. Dennis as the director
 of education for the Leeds and
 Grenville Counties Board of
 Education", said Dr. Baugh. He
 termed Mr. Dennis, "A giant
 in his field, and a man which
 we are extremely fortunate in
 receiving in our area." He later
 described Mr. Dennis as, "a
 dedicated, unselfish, humane
 and engaging individual who,
 coming from an area bearing
 similarities to ours, saw an ideal
 blend of urban and rural sur-
 roundings in which to create a
 reality of his ideals."

Mr. Dennis will conclude the
 terms of a current contract in
 western Ontario in April and
 will, according to Dr. Baugh,
 be available from that time to
 serve the board in an advisory
 capacity at no cost, until his
 official term of office begins
 June 16.

Lloyd A. Dennis was born
 November 9, 1925, at Aspdin,
 Ontario, nine miles west of
 Huntsville in the Muskoka dis-
 trict. He was raised and re-
 ceived his elementary education
 in the Muskoka area, attending
 Huntsville high school later. He
 went on to receive his Bachelor
 of Arts and Bachelor of Ed-
 ucation degrees from the Uni-
 versity of Toronto. From 1942
 to 1946 he was a lieutenant with
 the Canadian army in Europe,
 returning to Canada to take up
 his educational pursuits. He
 taught in a number of elemen-
 tary and secondary schools in
 the Toronto area and during
 1957-62 wrote a children's col-
 umn in a major Toronto daily
 newspaper. In 1966 he was ap-
 pointed to the provincial com-
 mittee studying the aims and
 objectives of Education in
 Schools in Ontario and with
 Mr. Justice Emmett Hall joined
 forces in preparation of the
 Hall-Dennis report on educa-
 tion, a report which changed the
 educational spectrum across the
 province. He is also author of
 a number of books, notably,
 "Living and Learning", an off-
 shoot of the Hall-Dennis re-
 port.

Mr. Dennis is divorced and
 the father of two daughters, cur-

scheduled to address the St.
 Mary's School PTA Wednesday,
 January 29 while on a visit to
 Brockville. Mr. Dennis is expect-
 ed to frequent Brockville during
 the next few months acting as
 advisor to the counties board
 of education. He officially will
 take over the reins of office
 June 16.

Lloyd Dennis In \$30,000 Per Year Education Post

Lloyd A. Dennis, co-author of the Hall-Dennis report on education in Ontario, Monday night was appointed director of education for Leeds and Grenville counties. Mr. Dennis, 44, takes over the \$30,000 a year post on June 16.

In other business Monday night, the counties board of education appointed Donald R. Price, of Gananoque, optometrist, chairman and George R. Brown, Cardinal dairy operator, was named vice-chairman. He is a former reeve of Cardinal and a former warden of Leeds and Grenville.

Mr. Price was challenged for the position by Dr. Charles Baugh, and O. E. "Kato" Keene. The election took place by secret ballot. Mr. Brown was one of four candidates seeking the post of vice-chairman.

The inaugural meeting of the board, held in the board room of Victoria school, was opened with Rev. Roland H. Glendining, member of the Brockville Ministerial Association and pastor of First Baptist church in the city, conducting prayers and bestowing blessing on the board in its endeavors.

During the 4½ hour meeting, the board passed a variety of motions including one requesting that Interim Secretary Treasurer J. S. Stratton, prepare a list of recommendations regarding the transportation of pupils in the Forthton-Addison areas. The motion followed an encounter by the board with a three man delegation of Addison area residents headed by Roy Livingston. The delegation rehashed a complaint concerning a bus route near Athens.

NINE STUDENTS

This problem came to light during a final meeting of the Brockville District High School Board. The area residents are requesting a change in already established bus routes so that nine public and high school students will have transportation without being taken by parents to a main artery or walking to catch a bus. Parents say that the difference involved is approximately 2.7 miles. The board after hearing pros and cons on the matter, passed the motion. Additional study is expected before any action is taken.

Other motions provided \$1,960 for membership of the board in the Ontario Public School Trustee Association, and ordered that the interim business administrator canvass former board members within the present jurisdiction of the new board, to determine their willingness to serve on committees to the Leeds and Grenville Counties Board of Education.

Dr. Baugh, seconded by A. Douglas Fraser of Prescott, moved that Lloyd A. Dennis be appointed the Director of Education for the Leeds and Grenville Counties Board of Education at a salary of \$30,000 per annum, beginning June 16, for one year, the contract to be

SPENDING ESTIMATES

A motion was also passed requesting that all boards in the authority of the counties during 1968 submit spending estimates for 1969 and that these estimates be before the board by January 31. Board members also established a 10-cent-per-mile travel allowance for themselves and board trustees and employees while travelling on official business. Mrs. Grace Wyatt, Brockville member, asked for a curfew on the late hours of the board's meetings. Mrs. Wyatt moved, supported by several members, that meetings of the board should start at 7:30 p.m. and curtail at 10:30 p.m. unless deemed necessary to continue until a 11 p.m. maximum, pending majority vote. The motion passed.

Reports from the individual committees saw the appointment of a director of education and a finance report by William Pickard.

Mr. Pickard in his financial report, stated that the new board through its bank, was borrowing money on a day to day basis to pay necessary costs, one of which this week was the signing of a promissory note in the amount of \$45,000 for school payrolls. Mr. Pickard noted that the board was paying interest only on money in overdraft, in

currently controlling the financial transactions of the board. SALARY COMMITTEE

A number of items of correspondence were received and in regards to several requests, a salary committee composed of board members, A. D. Fraser, O. E. Keene, Mrs. Grace Wyatt, J. A. Earle and J. F. Reid was set up to meet with Elementary Teachers Economic Policy Committee and the Leeds and Grenville Teacher's Salary Council Friday, January 10, in the city, to establish liaison for future salary negotiations between board and the teaching staffs.

The board also appointed Dr. Dale W. Wilson, Athens veterinarian, to the Leeds ARDA Board, while a request to appoint three board members to the Joint Advisory Committee of Conservation Education, of the Cataraqui Region Conservation Authority, was temporarily tabled pending more information.
