

Marking its entry into the life of the Brockville area, the evangelical group which no controls the big estate on No. 2 highway between Brockville and Maitland, is holding its first official "open house" on Friday evening.

"We would like all of the people of Brockville to visit us on the evening of Friday, December 12, for our "open house", said Dr. Alistar Haig, director of the Brockville Fellowship.

"We have planned an evening of refreshments, music and drama, as well as a tour of our buildings," he went on.

The former United Church minister sald the doors will be thrown open at 7:30 p.m and that Mrs. Pacitti of the music staff, in charge of the program, has promised an interesting evening of entertainment by the music and drama departments (MacDonnell Hall, named in honor of the first Roman Catholic Bishop of Upper Canadawill be the scene of the program.

The Berean Christian Schools opened in September with about 130 students. Its educational activities involve a pre-school program for ages two to five years and the regular elementary and high school program. The International Life Corps is an intensive three-year post-high school training college for young people whose lives will be given in the service of man-

The Berean establishment is Brockville is the first in Carada. The movement started is a Bible-reading group of eight in the home of the founder Warren Litzman, in Texas, sit years ago.
