# Reflects Increase In Area Population As Industry Moves In

The historic old Blue Church, four miles west of Prescott on Highway No. 2, will return to duties the original edifice served part time as the Augusta Township Area School Board has completed arrangements with the Rector and Wardens of St. John's Anglican Church, Prescott, to rent the building for use as a classroom to take care of an overflow of pupils from the Blue Church School, S.S. No. 1, Augusta, just across the County Highway

The original Blue Church was built through the efforts of the pioneering Church of England clergyman, Rev. Robert Blakey. The first, building was destroyed by fire, and a second was built in 1809. In 1845 the present Blue Church was erected, with timbers and other materials from the second building being used in the construction.

For some years the church has been unused except for annual memorial services, and the church and property was placed in the care of the rector and wardens of St. John's Anglican Church.

### Heavy Enrolment

When school re-opened for the Fall term on September 2nd, 52 pupils enrolled, although there was seating capacity for less than 40, Willard Shannon, of the Area Board told The Journal.

Installation of seats and blackboards and other equipment is being rushed by the Area Board and as soon as this is complete Mrs. James Brooks of Prescott, who started the term as teacher in the Blue Church School, will move into the church with Grades 5, 6 and 7. There are no Grade 8 pupils in the school this year. Miss Beverley Morris, whose position as innion grade taggher at position as junior grade teacher at Roebuck has been taken over by Mrs. Willis Drummond at Roebuck, is assisting in handling the large enrolment, and she will remain in the

school with the junior pupils.
Plans call for moving 10 pupils from S. S. No. 2 "Haley's School", on the 2nd Concession, northwest of the new C-I-L Matiland Works, to the Blue Church School to relieve overcrowding there where 35 pupils are registered and there is seating capacity for 25. This will bring the enrolment at the Blue Church classrooms to 62.

In the preparation of the arrangements for leasing the Blue Church as a classroom, the Church reserves the right to hold religious services should the continuing increase in population require the re-opening of the Blue Church.

### AUGUSTA TOWNSHIP SCHOOL AREA BOARD - SALARY SCHEDULE

Minimum Salary - Level 1 \$3000. - Level 2 \$3200. - Level 3 \$3400.

Maximum Salary - Level 1 \$4400. - Level 2 \$4800. - Level 3 \$5000.

An allowance of \$200. per year for four years' experience shall be paid to starting teachers.

An annual increment of \$200. shall be paid until the maximum is reached.

A grant of \$25.00 for hospitalization shall be paid all teachers in June.

Principals shall be paid \$100. per classroom up to six rooms.

Workmens' Compensation is carried on all teachers.

Supply teachers shall be paid \$15.00 per day and \$8.00 per half day.

Three days leave of absence with pay shall be granted a teacher in the event of a death in the immediate family; and one and one half days per school year leave of absence with pay for urgent reasons other than the illness of the teacher.

There is a cumulative sick leave plan whereby a teacher may obtain a maximum of 100 days to his credit. A maximum of 40 accumulated days may be used in one school year. One half of the unused portion of each year's days may be accumulated until a maximum is reached. A medical certificate shall be presented at the request of the Board.

Leave of absence due to pregnancy shall be without pay.

- Level 1 Standard One Certificate Including Second Class Teaching Certificates; First Class Teaching Certificates and Elementary School Teacher's Certificates.
- Level 2 Standard One Certificate plus five University Courses or five Department of Education Courses (Five week).
- Level 3 Standard One Certificate plus 10 University Courses or 10 Department of Education Courses (Five week).

Four Seminars to be equated to any one of the above courses.

No adjustment will be made on the salary of any teacher presently on the staff. Those remaining on the staff will be granted the usual \$200.00 increment from the present salary.

The above schedule will be reviewed in February 1965 by the Board-Teacher Salary Committee.



  i.e. Category One plus credit in ten University subjects beyond Grade 13 level, for each of which to a maximum of five may be substituted successful completion of a five-week Department of Education Summer or Winter session.
  - Note Equivalent Department of Education Courses completed prior to September 1, 1963, may be substituted for a university subject to a maximum of ten.
- (4) Four Elementary School Teacher's Certificate Standard 4

  i.e. Category One plus a Bachelor of Arts degree from an Ontario University or a degree the Minister deems equivalent.

Bachelor of Science in Agriculture
Bachelor of Applied Science
Bachelor of Household Science
Bachelor of Physical and Health Education

Note L. In Section 25 (1), "seather" means a person qualified to reach in an elementary or secondary school, and employed as a personnest methor by a beard, in accordance with Feat II and the regulations.

(2) All degrees in Arts or Science from Universities which are members of the National Conference of Universities.

25.—(1) The dismissal of a teacher, or the termination of the contract of a teacher, by a board shall be by notice in writing which shall state the reasons therefor, in accordance with the terms of the contract.

- Note 1. In Section 25 (1), "teacher" means a person qualified to teach in an elementary or secondary school, and employed as a permanent teacher by a board, in accordance with Part II and the regulations.
- Note 2. In case of termination of contract which is not mutually acceptable, the Board and Teacher should consult Part III of The Schools Administration Act, which deals with Boards of Reference.

#### FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION ACT

11.—(2) Notwithstanding Part III of The Schools Administration Act or any other Act and notwithstanding anything in the contract between the board and the teacher, where a permanent or probationary teacher is employed by a board and a matter arises which in the opinion of the Minister adversely affects the welfare of the school in which the teacher is employed.

- (a) the board or the teacher may, with the consent of the Minister, give the other party thirty days written notice of termination, and the contract is terminated at the expiration of thirty days from the date notice is given; or
- (b) the board may, with the consent of the Minister, give the teacher written notice of immediate termination, together with one-tenth of the teacher's yearly salary in addition to the amount to which he would otherwise be entitled, and the contract thereupon is terminated.

#### FROM THE REGULATIONS MADE UNDER THE TEACHING PROFESSION ACT

15—(2) A member shall not

(a) break a contract of employment with a board of trustees, or

(b) violate a written or oral agreement to enter into a contract of employment with a board of trustees, or

(c) while holding a contract of employment with a board of trustees make application for another position the acceptance of which would necessitate his seeking the termination of his contract by mutual consent of the teacher and the board, unless and until he has arranged with his board for such termination of contract if he obtains the other position.

Note: If a teacher agrees to enter the employment of a School Board the following September, the Ontario Teachers' Federation considers it a breach of contract for the teacher to terminate the contract before he has entered upon his duties under the said contract, unless consent has been given by the employing Board.

### Allowance for Previous Experience

- 1. Place on scale if interruption of less than 3 continuous years in teaching at time the teacher is engaged by the Augusta Board.
- 2. A maximum of five years if the teacher has not been teaching regularly during the last three years previous to engagement by the Augusta Board.
- 3. That the initial salary of experienced teachers shall not exceed the salary already paid to a present member with corresponding total experience and qualifications.

### Allowance for Responsibility

- 1. Principals \$150 x 6 plus \$100 for additional classrooms
- 2. Vice-Principals \$400
- 3. Principals' Relief \$300

### Special Allowances

- 1. Elementary Certificate (Art, Music, Phys. & Health Ed., Lib.1, Or. Fr.)- \$300
- 2. Intermediate Certificate, as above, Library 2 \$400
- 3. Specialist Certificate, as above \$500
- 4. \$100 Expense Allowance for Summer & Winter School Course as recognized by the Department.

### Accumulative Sick Leave Plan

The present plan whereby a teacher may accumulate one-half of the unused statutory sick leave days allowed in a year (20) to a maximum of 200 days.

### Sick Leave Gratuity

When a teacher retires due to illness certified by a medical practitioner on grounds other than pregnancy, a gratuity based on her salary on date of retirement calculated on one-half of the accumulated sick leave credit noted above.

### Pregnancy Clause

A teacher who becomes pregnant shall advise the Board as early as possible in order that a replacement may be arranged. Her contract will be terminated at the end of the fifth month of pregnancy, or at the school term beginning in September, January or Easter, whichever is earlier. Sick leave gratuity will be honoured as per salary schedule.

### Leave of Absence

Three days leave of absence with pay shall be granted a teacher in the event of a death in the immediate family; and one and one-half days per school year leave of absence with pay for urgent reasons other than illness of the teacher.

### Change of Category

A teacher who qualifies for a change of category by reason of improved qualifications shall receive the applicable differential amount in addition to the amount of adjustment to the new schedule.

### Emergency Clause

In case of exceptional circumstances, the Board reserves the right to pay more than the salary schedule for a teacher with Special Qualifications if such is required.

### Retirement Gratuity

That, in the case of teachers leaving this Board's employ, and retiring from the profession on superannuation, there be compensation allowed for unused sick leave credit amounting to 50% of sick leave credit accumulated while the teacher is in the employ of the Augusta T.S.A. Board, to a maximum of 100 days. This compensation would be paid at the per diem rate of the salary immediately prior to retirement from the profession.

# Augusta Area Board Plans 4- Room School

Tentative approval has been granted the August Township School Area Board by the Township Council for the erection of a new four-roomed school on the Connell sub-division west of Prescott. Following appro-val by the Municipal Board, an architect will be consulted and tenders will be called at the earliest possible

The site is several hundred feet from the highway on a tract partly donated by Ernest Connell and partly under option by the Township Council. The drive-in to it will lead to the Mervin Lane. At the present time all Grades 1 and 2 of the children belonging in the Blue Church are attending school in Maitland. A number of houses are being erected on the Connell sub-division, and a D.V.A. housing project is planned north of the railway line on the Mervin Lane. The new school will also take care of the four senior grades in the Brundige school, where over-crowding exists. | building of the new school.

A survey has been taken in the schools in the district of the preschool children, and approval was granted by the Department of Education for the four-room school when the results of the survey were sent to Toronto.

All members of the Township Council were present at the meeting called by the School Board in the new Maitland Public School. The Council members expressed approval of the Maitland School which was opened for use on March 21st. Mr. Holmes, Inspector of Public Schools for Grenville County, explained the overcrowding in the schools in the south of the township at the present time and the effect the large number of pre-school children would have on the situation in the next few years. The Council members were most co-operative and, after a brief meeting in another room, returned to the School Board with a motion giving tentative approval to the:

Complete with new furniture, the new classrooms are a vast improvement over the old one-room schools used for years, and teachers and pupils will benefit in health and learn-


The opening of Churchill School marks the second school to be built and opened by the Augusta township board in the past year. After a quarter of a century of marking time, township school officials found themselves suddenly swamped with children of public school age. Industry coming into the area, mainly Du Pont and RCA Victor, brought many

new residents, and immigration from Europe following World War II saw: many new families take up residence in the area.

As an illustration of the school population growth, there are now over 40 pupils in the first four grades in Brundige's School, SS No. 7, north of Prescott. Pupils in grade five to eight will be transported to the new Churchill School; as will those of grades six to eight from Domville, and all the pupils of Perrin's School, SS No 12. These pupils had been taken to the Union Grove School, but this building is now overcrowded.

The opening of Churchill School witnesses also the closing of three old school buildings in the township. The old Blue Church School, SS No. 1, has been unsatisfactory from a health standpoint according to the standards of the Leeds and Gren-ville Health Unit; Haley's, SS No. 2, has been taken over by the Ontario Department of Highways for the building of the new superhighway 401; and the old stone school at Maitland has taken care of its last pupils.

Frank Turnbull who hails from the West and who taught in Haley's School from September, in the principal of Churchill School, his pupils coming with him to the new school. He will teach grades 7 and 8.
