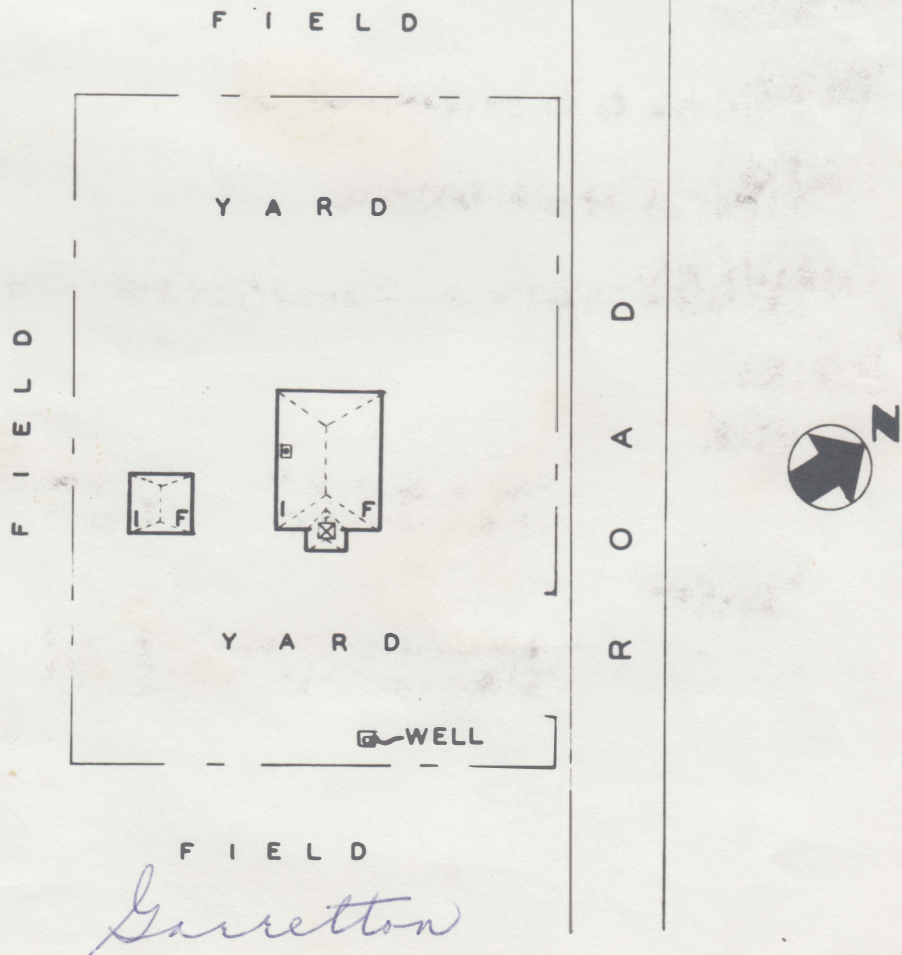

GARRETTON SCHOOL

The history of the school in our section is rather an interesting one. There were three schools, but many teachers.

Before any school was built, a teacher was hired who went from one home to another to board. The children gathered at the home where the teacher stayed. Even in the first school, attendance was poor. The big boys helped at home in the Spring, Summer and Fall, and attended school during the Winter. I heard one man say, "Those were the good old days."

The first school built in the section was a log one, built at the corner just south of the present one on the east side of the road. A few of the residents tell of the long benches and desks. One man told of having been pushed all the way along under the desk without the teacher having known what was taking place. At times, the water in the creek rose to such a height that they could row to the school door in a boat. In 1878, Miss Jane Davis taught in this school. She was followed in 1879 by Miss Elizabeth McElree, who was succeeded in 1880 by Miss Jennie Thompson. Miss Thompson received a salary of \$120 per year. In 1880, Mr. William Kinch was paid \$2 for lighting the fires.

A new school was built on the site of the present one. It went by the name of the "old red school". The woodshed was at the front and you had to pass through it to get into the school. In the course of time, this school got into poor condition. There were big rat holes in the floor, and many a poor teacher was terrified by the rats which appeared in these holes. The school was condemned. While the present one was being built, school was held in the old store which used to be opposite the old log school on the west side of the road.

The present school was built in 1915. The cost of the site was \$500.00, and the school itself cost \$2,200. It was a great improvement on the old school.

There have been many students enter and leave the school. Most of them have become good Canadian citizens. The school, however, has not been without its famous men. Mr. Sam Johnston, who attended the old log school, became a senator in the State of Minnesota, USA. Mr. Sam Streight, who went to the old red school, is now a doctor in Toronto.
