One large wood burning stove, not on metal base, exposed to classroom.

Water is obtained for fire protection from farm house approximately one-half mile away.

Hydro with lomex cable.

Attendance

At present time, 36 children.

Recommendations

It is understood that a through highway is planned, necessitating the demolition of the building in the near future.



SCHOOL SECTION No 2

LOT 24 CONCESSION I

Haley's School building disappeared when Highway #401 was built. Located on the 2nd Concession, at the corner of the Rockey Road, it was named for the owners of the farm on which it was built, as was the custom of the time. It was a one-room frame building, heated by a box stove. For many years the secretary was Mr. Ed McKim, who was followed by Mr. Donald Giffin, who also served for a very long time. In office when Augusta Township Schol Area Board came into being was Mrs. John Burns.

Two teachers who served long terms there, and who did excellent work, wwere Mrs. Lorna Eadie (nee Greer) and Mrs. Pearl G. Brady (nee Moore) for 13 years. Included in the list of trustees for long periods were George Ferguson, Christopher Dalgleish and Edwin McKim. Mr. McKim was a keen local historian, whose writings have been published from time to time in the local press. The story is told of Mr. Ferguson, who was always Chairman for the Christmas concert, that at one such event, the chair collapsed under him (he being a very stout man), causing much merriment among the children.

Among those who attended this school and have since become well-known figures was Captain Wilfrid Snider, who originated the Snider Boat Lines, Brockville, which served thousands of tourists to the Thousand Islands each summer for many years.

Captain Matthew Farrell, one of a family of 14 who attended this school, became owner of the ferry from Brockville to Morristown, N. Y. He received the Papal Honour "Knight of St. Gregory", and died June 1963, aged 89 years.

The first teacher was probably a Mr. Miller. Mrs. McKim notes that the first day he came, he wore such a heavy mustache that the children were very frightened of him. This he removed when he learned of the effect it had on his pupils, an act much appreciated by the girls especially, including Mrs. McKim, very young at the time. Mr. Newman, the Mrs. Gray and then a Miss Perkinson, Mrs. McKim recalls. Captain Snider recollects that she was a "perfect old maid". She boarded in his mother's home, and when she scolded him at school, he gave her wet wood to burn in the stove in her room at night!

OUTSTANDING PUPILS OF HALEY'S SCHOOL - S.S.#2 AUGUSTA

- 1. MRS. EDWIN A MCKIM nee GERTRUDE SNIDER, lived for more than 90 years in Brockville, where she was mentioned in the yearly reports of Brockville General Hospital for her sewing record.
- 2. EDWIN A MCKIM keen local historian. Wrote many articles for the Recorder & Times, and most notably a longer article called "The Road". It covered every property on No. 2 Highway from Murray Street, Brockville, to the town of Prescott, giving the history of settlement and ownership.
- 3. CAPTAIN WILFRED SNIDER founder and owner of Snider Boat Lines, with his 2 sons, Everett and Charles, was very well-known on the St. Lawrence and among those who lived or travelled in the Thousand Island area.
- 4. JCHN WILSON won the Military Medal overseas in World War 1, 38th Battalion, in France.
- 5. CAPTAIN MATHEW FARRELL, one of a family of 14 children, who owned the ferry boat which served travellers from Brockville to Morristown. He received the Papal honour, "Knight of St. Gregory". Died June 1963, aged 89 years.
- 6. JAMES FARRELL Deputy Sherriff of St. Lawrence County, New York State; Immigration Officer at Morristown.
- 7. JOHN BURNS Overseas service in World War 1, Veterans' Guard in World War 2.
- 8. THOMAS and GEORGE McLEAN successful farmers on Highway #2 over 80 years. Dupont of Canada is located on their former holding.
- 9. GORDON FOX Overseas casualty in World War II.
- 10. CLIFFCRD YOUNG Casualty with America forces, World War II.
- 11. JEANNE BURNS MOORE graduated from BCIVS, 1942, with a stenography record in speed which has not been surpassed. Employed at Corbett & Musclow Law firm.
- 12. BRENDA BELL an excellent student, attended Queen's University.
- 13. LECNA KEMP artist and teacher. Married, living in Montreal.

Miss Smith came from Western Ontario, the Miss McCorkill, who married Ben Hanna and lived nearby. She was a great favorite with the children, Mrs. McKim recalls helping her with the younger children, a practice often necessary in crowded rural schools with all grades. She was even allowed to mark their exam papers!

Other teachers included Mrs. John Burns; Mrs. Pearl Brady; Maude Webster;
Bess Weir; Nellie Latham; Miss Carruthers; Ethel Snider; Mayme Barton; Miss
Kennedy from Irish Greek (Captain Snider says she was "not worth powder to blow her
up"); Florence Hough; Miss Falph; Miss Kelly; Miss Coskoran; Miss Edwards;
Miss Edith Yuill; Miss Fannie Miller; Miss Trelford; Lena Fretwell (later Mrs.
Delbert Armstrong); Mary Piercy; Priscilla Dodd; Maria Rathwell; Marjorie
Fairbairn (Mrs. Willis Drummond); Marjorie Moore; Bea Johnson; Eva Thorpe
McMullen; Lorna Greer; Janetta McPhail; John Hayes. When the school closed,
Frank Turnbull was in charge, and he went with the children to Churchill Public
School, Merwin Lane Road, where he was Principal of the 4 -rcom school.

The enrolment was never large, since it was a small building. Equipment included an organ valued at \$8.80 in 1929. Hot lunches were served by the teacher and pupils during the winter months during the time when that was popular in most rural schools. The building wad demolished when the new highway was being built.
