














These random shots show the earliest part of the burying grounds, at the rear of the Methodist Chapel, and now the Soldiers' Memorial stone.

Note the field stone markers, worn with the elements, to be lost as to identity.

The white stone at the left is that of Lieut. John Dulmage who fell at the Battle of the Windmill, Nov. 13, 1838.





In this part of the cemetery on August 1, 1814, the first known burial was made. Directly back of the cenotaph, is a small stone recording the burial of Ruth, daughter of Joseph and Louisa Scott, aged 16 years, 5 months. This was before the Methodist Chapel had been erected in 1818. Also recorded here is the burial of Sally, wife of Robert Ralston, July 1818, and Eben Sherwood, August 1818.



























LIGUT. JOHN DULMAGE 2nd Regiment, Crenville Militia who gloriously fall in action while fighting for his Queen and Country against the rebels








Restoration work done on the stone marking the grave of Lieut. John Dulmage. A metal border was placed around it, and it was strengthened with a new base. — Carl Durant.
